## National Code – International Students Only

In addition to Astra's policies and procedures, international students will also need to be aware of Astra's obligations under the <u>National Code of Practice for Providers of Education and Training to Overseas Students 2018</u> and what this means for your study in Australia.

In Australia, a student is considered an international student if they are not an Australian citizen, Australian permanent resident, New Zealand citizen, or a holder of an Australian permanent resident humanitarian visa.

## What is the National Code?

The <u>National Code of Practice for Providers of Education and Training to</u>
<u>Overseas Students 2018</u> (also known as the 'National Code') is a legislative instrument made under the Education Services for Overseas Students Act 2000 (ESOS Act) and sets nationally consistent standards that:

- supports providers to deliver quality education and training to overseas students; and
- 2. governs the protection of international students enrolled in CRICOS register courses.

The National Code does not apply to domestic students.

## How does the National Code impact me?

For international students under the National Code you:

- generally cannot transfer between registered providers prior to completing six calendar months of the main course of study for which your student visa was issued (<u>Standard 7</u>)
- 2. must maintain satisfactory course progress as defined in the 'Student Progression and Exclusion Policy and Procedure' (Standard 8)
- 3. must study at least one unit in 'face-to-face' mode in each trimester and can only complete one-third of your course online (Standard 8)

Your Australian student visa will have included a list of the various other conditions you must follow.
